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
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

And the questions that comprise the book are the ones general educators ask me all the time. My hope is that teachers enjoy reading this book cover-to-cover and then keep it close by for whenever they need a little boost.


You've had diverse experiences as an autism educator, a clinical social worker, a school administrator, and an autism parent. How have these experiences influenced your work?

My son on the spectrum came along years after I was already working in this field. Having sat on all sides of the table in the special ed office, I've seen misunderstandings simmer and doubt bubble up, sparking defensiveness and distrust in all directions. I understand what drives this challenging dynamic and I love helping educators and families learn to value each other's expertise, communicate with confidence and humility, and build empathic, productive partnerships that support the children we share.

How can school and district leaders ensure positive, inclusive environments?

A truly inclusive environment must include buy-in from the whole school community—top to bottom, side to side, inside and out. I urge leaders to provide specific trainings and resources not only to classroom teachers, but also to classroom paraprofessionals, secretaries, custodians, related service providers, security guards, nurses, special area teachers, bus staff, lunch monitors, recess aides, and administrators. When students with disabilities are met with differentiated support and radical acceptance at every turn, anything is possible!



What will educators find most valuable in the book *Yes We Can!*?



Why is a collaborative partnership between general and special education important for closing achievement gaps?

All means all. Schools will hit a brick wall in their attempt to improve outcomes for kids across the board if they do not begin to shift mindsets and practices around our most at-risk students. When general and special educators stop seeing themselves as living in two separate silos and instead collaborate as members of one team, then we may stop having different expectations for each group of students and see them all as capable of learning at high levels.

What are some practical strategies for building a school culture that believes all students can succeed?

Do more than just say you believe all students can succeed. Commit to addressing actions and statements that are not in alignment with this belief. It is critical that individuals in the system or school feel comfortable addressing behaviors that are not in alignment. This takes courage, and courage is contagious. Unfortunately, so is negativity and lack of belief, so it is critical that our energy is focused on living our beliefs versus finding fault in factors we cannot control. It is very easy to say that all students can succeed, but to truly live it is not always easy.






