Figure 2.11: Reimagining Texts to Convey New Insights

Directions: Transform a scene from our class text and re-envision it from a new perspective in order to convey a different meaning. Follow the steps to think about the changes you'd like to make and why.

Step 1: Identify the aspect to reimagine

Consider the following questions.

- What did you like or dislike about the beginning of the book? Explain your response.
- What did you like or dislike about the ending of the book? Explain your response.
- What were your favorite parts of this story or your least favorite? Explain your response.

Step 2: Analyze

Consider the following questions.

- How might the characters in this text behave differently if they were from a different socioeconomic class, had a different skin color, were a different gender or expressed a different gender identity, and so on?
- How might the theme of this story be different if the characters made different choices in their words or actions?
- If you could use these characters to tell a different story, what story would you tell?
- What changes would this new story require?
- In this different story, what message would you like to convey?
- Why is this new story important to tell?

Step 3: Create

Using your answers, make the following decisions.

- What message do you want to express?
- Through what format do you want to tell it? (Choose one: spin-off, prequel, sequel, or reimagining.)
