## **Creating a Claim**

**Directions:** Follow the steps to develop an original claim about the text. Remember, a claim is a statement or an argument that you believe to be true and will try to prove with explicit evidence from the text.

- 2. Based on your discoveries from annotating the text and engaging in the Question Formulation Technique activity, write five discoveries you have made about the text.
- 3. On your Notebook page, jot down any ideas you have about how these separate discoveries connect to each other and work together to create meaning.
- 4. In your Notebook, write what theory you have based on the relationships you've noticed among these discoveries.
- 5. In your Notebook, write what element of the text this theory focuses on: character, conflict, or writer's craft.
- 6. In your Notebook, write the following and complete the sentence: So far, my claim about the text is \_\_\_\_\_\_.
- 7. In your Notebook, write what pieces of evidence you can use to develop your claim.

## **Evaluating a Claim**

Is your claim EPIC?

**Engaging:** Is the working claim engaging? Does your claim spark curiosity and wonder, both for you and in other readers?

**Provable:** Is the working claim provable? Do your annotations provide at least two pieces of evidence to support your claim?

**Insightful:** Is the working claim insightful? Does your claim invite readers to go below the surface and think more deeply about the text? In other words, what is the text really saying?

**Clearly stated:** Is the working claim clearly stated? Is the wording of the claim concise and understandable?
