Tool 29: Poster Project for Reading Strategies

Students were asked to create a poster for each of the reading strategies that they had practiced. The posters demonstrated their own definition and example(s) of the strategy. Teachers would therefore use this rubric two times if students were in the essential knowledge layer, four times if students were in the application layer, and five times if students were in the complex-thinking layer of learning.
