

Teacher Checklist for Blogging Projects

Because blogging projects mirror work that most teachers are already having students do in class—producing written content—they are a natural first step for digital novices. The following yes or no questions will help you determine whether or not you are prepared to facilitate blogging projects in your classroom. Under “Your Response / Next Steps,” list what needs to be done along with a date for when this action should be completed.

1. Does your school or district’s technology services department have a preferred blogging service? Have they already made arrangements for students or teachers to have free accounts at those services?
