

## Wiki Tasks for Student Groups

One of the best ways for your research group to report about the global challenge you are studying in class is to create a wiki page. After your teacher creates student accounts for everyone in your class and introduces you to the basics of wiki work, use the following checklist to organize your group's collective efforts.

### Questions to Consider

1. Does every member of your group understand how to add content—text, images, links, video—and make edits to your shared wiki page?
