Title	Author	Story Summary
Elementary		
<i>Each Kindness</i>	Jacqueline Woodson (2012)	A young girl is from a family of a lower-socioeconomic status and living under the poverty line. Students in the class learn to be kind and understanding of others' hardships.
<i>Fly Away Home</i>	Eve Bunting (1991)	A homeless boy and his father living in an airport find hope through watching a trapped bird make its way to freedom.
<i>Last Stop on Market Street</i>	Matt de la Peña (2015)	This is the story of an African American boy and his grandmother, which addresses socioeconomic differences between the boy and his friends.
<i>Passage to Freedom: The Sugihara Story</i>	Ken Mochizuki (2010)	In this story of a young Japanese boy and his family during World War II, the father helps Jewish refugees flee to safety.
<i>When Jackie and Hank Met</i>	Cathy Goldberg Fishman (2012)	In this story, African American baseball player Jackie Robinson and Jewish baseball player Hank Greenberg experience many common hardships due to a lack of acceptance of differences during the 1940s and 1950s.

<i>La Frontera: El Viaje Con Papá (My Journey With Papa)</i>	Deborah Mills and Alfredo Alva (2018)	A young Mexican boy and his father make the journey to immigrate from Mexico to Texas.
<i>The Lunch Thief</i>	Anne C. Bromley (2010)	A young boy who is homeless steals lunches to survive. Another student gains understanding and shares his lunch.
<i>The Streets Are Free</i>	Kurusa (1995)	Venezuelan children living in poverty work together to create a community park.
