- 4. What is the flooring throughout the space?
- 5. Where are the closets and cabinets?
- 6. How does your entryway appear? Is it welcoming?
- 7. Add the following to your drawing:

- 2. Where are these materials located? Indicate them on your drawing.

Section III. Sensory and Natural Elements

- 1. What do you have in your current learning space that impacts the senses: temperature, sounds, smells, visual display?
- 2. Do you have elements of nature (plants, class pets, and so on) in your classroom? List them.

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Section IV. The Social Environment

- 1. How interactive are the children in your class with one another?
- 2. What types of interactions does the space support?
- 3. How many children are in your current learning space?
- 4. How many students can occupy defined work areas at one given time?
